Short Summary

According to CHRDR, Feng Zhenghu, a Shanghai human rights activist and "citizen lawyer" was administratively detained on June 5, 2008 for ten days. Boxun reports that Feng was released from the the Shanghai PSB Yangpu Subdivision Detention Center on June 15, 2008. The purported basis for his detention involved disruption of social order; CHRDR believes, however, that Feng was detained for having compiled information about hundreds of Shanghai court cases that were allegedly wrongfully decided and distributing a related publication to government officials. On February 15, 2009, Shanghai authorities detained Feng in Beijing, forcibly brought him back to Shanghai, and inexplicably held him in a "black jail" for 41 days. He was released on March 25, 2009. From November 2009 to February 2010, Feng refused to leave a waiting area in Japan's Narita Airport after Chinese officials denied him entry to Shanghai multiple times. In February 2010, Feng returned to Shanghai, where he has been under "house arrest." According to [CHRDR](#), in early August 2010, police took Feng from his home for interrogation while also seizing his property, including computers and cell phones.
