Short Summary

According to CAA ([17 October 10](#), [18 October 10](#)), domestic security protection officers raided a gathering of over 30 house church Protestants in a hotel in Shunyi district, Beijing municipality, on October 17, 2010. The Protestants met to worship after they were [stopped from leaving China to attend the Third Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization](#), held in Cape Town, South Africa. The officers reportedly accused the Protestants of holding an illegal gathering, sent several of them home, and took into custody pastors Jin Tianming, Jin Mingri, Fang Bing, and Li Shengfeng, as well as several other Protestants at the gathering. Sources do not provide details on their release, but according to RFA ([12 April 11](#)) and CAA ([16 April 11](#), [16 April 11](#)), public security officials from Haidian district, Beijing, restricted Jin Tianming's movements and communications on April 10 and 11, 2011, surrounding an outdoor worship meeting by members of the Shouwang Church, which he leads, and took him into custody on April 16, a day before members of Shouwang worshipped outdoors a second time. Officials reportedly released him on April 17.
